Introduction

Welcome to Atlas Explorer, the first complete world geography software package that helps you learn geography quickly and easily. You can take a tour of the world, traveling to faraway places with just a push of a button! Learn interesting facts as you travel and then quiz yourself on what you have learned. It's a great way to sharpen your knowledge of the world around you.

From the large collection of detailed maps, you can move from a view of the world to maps of continents, subcontinents, countries and more. On the way, learn interesting facts about a specific area—its capital, population, official language, currency and land area. Then, quiz yourself and see how much you have learned!

The Atlas Explorer database contains information on every country in the world, plus the states of the United States and Mexico, provinces of Canada and China, republics of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, and the administrative divisions of the United Kingdom.

Best of all, Atlas Explorer is a breeze to use; just jump in and try it and start learning about the world around you today!

About this Manual

Purpose of this manual

This manual is designed to teach you what you need to know to run Atlas Explorer. It assumes you understand how to operate a Macintosh computer and know the basic Macintosh terminology. If you are unfamiliar with the Macintosh, please consult your Macintosh manual. If you have any problems with your computer, printer, mouse, or other hardware, please consult the manuals for those products.

Brief overview of the manual

This manual has three sections. **Getting Started** describes what you need to run Atlas Explorer on your computer. The **Overview** is designed for experienced Macintosh users who want to jump right in and try Atlas Explorer. The **Instructions** section provides a step-by-step guide on how to use Atlas Explorer and explains each program feature in detail.

Getting Started

Hardware and software requirements

To run Atlas Explorer, you will need:

- · a Macintosh Plus, SE, or II
- one or two 800K disk drives* or a hard disk drive
- System version 4.2 and Finder version 6.0
- a printer (optional)
- * Two disk drives are recommended for using Atlas Explorer to minimize disk swapping.

For information on how to set up your system, printer, or other hardware, refer to the related hardware manuals. You will find the specifications you need there.

Making a working copy

As a convenience to registered users, Atlas Explorer disks are not copy protected. This allows you to make a copy of your software to use as a working copy. Refer to your Macintosh manual if you need directions for copying your disk. Once you have made a copy of the Atlas Explorer disk, put the original in a safe place and work only with your backup.

Please do not give a copy of Atlas Explorer to anyone else—that is a copyright violation.

Starting the program

If you have one disk drive:

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- 2 Insert the Atlas Explorer program disk.
- 3 Double-click the Atlas Explorer program icon.
- 4 The Atlas Explorer copyright notice appears on your screen and disappears after a few seconds.
- 5 If Record Keeping is off, as it is when you first open Atlas Explorer, you may skip to the next step.


If Record Keeping is on, Atlas Explorer will ask you for your name:



Your name is needed only if you intend to use Record Keeping. If you do not want to use the Record Keeping feature, click Cancel. Atlas Explorer will automatically turn off Record Keeping, and no name is required. Skip to the next step.

If you intend to use Record Keeping, enter your name and click OK.


Now, Atlas Explorer will ask you to select a data disk and folder:



Click Eject to remove the program disk and insert a disk into the drive. Click OK. Atlas Explorer will then eject the data disk and ask you to re-insert the program disk.

NOTE: For more information on the Record Keeping feature and on the use of a data disk, see *Review of Results* and *Record Keeping* in this manual.

- 6 A turning globe appears on your screen. Click on the screen.
- 7 The world map appears on your screen in Explorer mode.



Start using Atlas Explorer!

If you have two disk drives:

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- Insert the program disk in one drive and a data disk (any initialized disk) in the other drive. NOTE: You do not need a data disk if you do not intend to use Record Keeping.
- 3 Double-click the Atlas Explorer program icon.
- 4 The Atlas Explorer copyright notice appears on your screen and disappears after a few seconds.
- 5 If Record Keeping is off, as it is when you first open Atlas Explorer, you may skip to the next step.


If Record Keeping is on, Atlas Explorer will ask you for your name:



Your name is needed only if you intend to use Record Keeping. If you do not want to use the Record Keeping feature, click Cancel. Atlas Explorer will automatically turn off Record Keeping, and no name is required. Skip to the next step.

If you intend to use Record Keeping, enter your name and click OK.

Now, Atlas Explorer will ask you to select a data disk and folder:



Start using Atlas Explorer!

If you have a hard disk:

- 2 First time only: Copy the program disk onto your hard disk. First create an empty folder on your hard drive. Then select both Atlas Explorer™ and AE Library and drag them to the new folder. (If you do not know how to do this, please consult your Macintosh manual.)
- 3 Double-click the Atlas Explorer program icon.
- 4 The Atlas Explorer copyright notice appears on your screen and disappears after a few seconds.
- 5 If Record Keeping is off, as it is when you first open Atlas Explorer, you may skip to the next step.


If Record Keeping is on, Atlas Explorer will ask you for your name:



Your name is needed only if you intend to use Record Keeping. If you do not want to use the Record Keeping feature, click Cancel. Atlas Explorer will automatically turn off Record Keeping, and no name is required. Skip to the next step.

If you intend to use Record Keeping, enter your name and click OK.

Now, Atlas Explorer will ask you to select a data disk and folder:




To save data files on your hard disk, first double click on the folder you want to use. When you are in this folder (it may be empty) then click OK. Data files containing quiz scores and other data will be stored in this folder.

To save data files on a floppy disk, insert the disk and click Drive so that the floppy disk is selected. When you are ready, click OK.

NOTE: For more information on the Record Keeping feature and on the use of a data disk, see *Review of Results* and *Record Keeping* in this manual.

- 6 A turning globe appears on your screen. Click on the screen.
- 7 The world map appears on your screen in Explorer mode.




Opening screens of Atlas Explorer

When you first start Atlas Explorer, three different screens will appear on your screen right away. The first is the Atlas Explorer copyright notice screen.

The second is a spinning globe. The globe will remain on your screen until you click the mouse button, or for up to 10 seconds. Then, it will move on to the next screen. The globe screen looks like this:



Finally, you will come to the world map in "Explorer" mode. "Explorer" mode is the mode in which you are able to travel around and explore various places in the world. The world map looks like this:



Atlas Explorer uses standard Macintosh pull down menus, and many commands have command key equivalents listed in the menu. The maps on this screen are similar to those you will see everywhere in Atlas Explorer. The Mastery Icons display your level of knowledge with regard to each continent. They cannot be shown if Record Keeping is off. For more information on Mastery Icons, see *Mastery Icons* in this manual.

On-line help

On-line help is always available if you get stuck in the program. Just choose Help from the Apple menu. A dialog box will then appear. This dialog box will contain two scrolling lists. The top list contains topics and the bottom list contains subtopics for the topic which is currently highlighted in the top list.

Use the mouse to scroll and select the topic you want from the top list. Then select the subtopic from the bottom list. Then click OK to get help. After you are done or if you change your mind, click cancel to return to the Explorer mode.

Overview

Moving around the world

Moving around the world is easy in Atlas Explorer's "Explorer mode." Just click on the part of the world where you want to go. Atlas Explorer produces an enlarged map of that area, labelled with the name of the continent, sub-continent, or country in the title bar. Click each map to move to increasingly more detailed maps. When Atlas Explorer shades in a country, state, or province, you are at the most detailed level possible in that area of the world.

To move back toward the world map, click the small box at the upper left hand corner of the map window. Each time you do this, Atlas Explorer brings you one step closer to the world map.

Taking quizzes

With Atlas Explorer, you can quiz yourself on any place in the world. Just move around the world in Explorer mode until the place you want to be quizzed on is described in the title bar and displayed on the screen. Then pull down the Play menu and choose Begin Quiz.

Atlas Explorer will automatically return to Explorer mode when the specified number of questions have been answered. If no number was specified, Atlas Explorer gives you an unlimited number of questions. In either case, you can choose End Quiz in the Play menu to end the quiz and return to Explorer mode.

Atlas Explorer tutorial

The Atlas Explorer tutorial presents you with information about the place or places that appear on the map on your screen. Pull down the Play menu and choose Begin Tutorial. Atlas Explorer then overlays the bottom part of the map with a tutorial window containing facts for the specified area.

To return to Explorer mode, choose End Tutorial in the Play menu.

Record keeping

Record keeping is a special function of Atlas Explorer that enables you to keep track of your score or the scores of an entire classroom. You can also use it to analyze your individual work sessions or to gauge the performance of your class. Turn it on or off in the Play menu by clicking Record Keeping.

Review


The Review menu enables you to retake the quiz you just took, set options for retaking a quiz, review the questions asked, or analyze individual or class performance. The review feature enables you to put extra effort into the questions you missed so you can master the material more effectively.

Instructions

Moving around the world

Moving around the world is easy with Atlas Explorer. Starting on the world map, just click on the area where you want to go. Atlas Explorer takes you to an enlarged map of that area of the world, labelled with the area's name in the title bar. Each time you click on a map, you move to the next level of detail. This is the "Explorer mode" of Atlas Explorer. Here's an example:


Click South America.




Click Brazil.



A sub-continent map appears on your screen.




Now, click Brazil again. Atlas Explorer puts the name of the country in the title bar and shades in the country outline on your screen.




To return to the world map, just click the close box in the left side of the map's title bar. Each time you do this, Atlas Explorer will move closer and closer to the world map. Try it!

Studying the locations of countries, states, and provinces

Atlas Explorer's Explorer mode is great for studying the locations of countries, states, and provinces in the world. To study the provinces of China, for example, click Asia, and then do the same on China. Your screen should look like this:



Now click any of the land areas and Atlas Explorer shades in the area and displays its name in the title bar on your screen.



Just click each province and try to memorize its name. When you are finished, you can quiz yourself on province locations.


Studying locations works the same way for countries, states, and other areas as well.

Atlas Explorer Tutorial

The Atlas Explorer Tutorial is designed to help you learn about different places in the world. The kinds of information you will learn include population, area, language, the country's currency, the capital, and major cities. The information is displayed in the tutorial window at the bottom of your screen.


How the tutorial works

The Atlas Explorer Tutorial provides specific information for the area shown in the title bar. Select a continent and the tutorial provides information about the continent. Select a country and you will learn about the country. Select a state or province, and the Atlas Explorer Tutorial teaches you about that state or province. Just select the area and choose Begin Tutorial in the Play menu to get started!




Tutorial example


For this example, start by bringing up the world map on your screen if it isn't already there. Let's say you want to have a tutorial on the state of California. First, highlight California on your screen. Start by clicking North America.




Click the United States.



Click California to highlight it.




Now, choose Begin Tutorial in the Play menu. The tutorial window for the displayed map appears on the screen.




After studying the tutorial information, click the close box in the tutorial window.

Atlas Explorer closes the window so that you can see the rest of the map.



Although the tutorial window is not showing, Atlas Explorer remains in Tutorial mode. If you are also studying Oregon in a unit on the west coast and you want a tutorial on that state next, simply click it to select it. Oregon becomes highlighted and the Oregon tutorial window appears on your screen. It's just that easy!



Atlas Explorer stays in tutorial mode until you choose End Tutorial in the Play menu. You can even go to the country, continent, or world level and back again while remaining in tutorial mode.

NOTE: To return to Explorer mode, choose End tutorial in the Play menu.


Taking quizzes

The Atlas Explorer quiz feature enables you to quiz yourself on what you have learned about different regions of the world. You can take a quiz on a continent or country, or on the states of the US and Mexico, provinces of Canada and China, Soviet Socialist Republics of the USSR, and the administrative divisions of the UK.

Setting quiz options

Before taking a quiz, you can set quiz options that affect the way the quiz is presented.

To set or change the quiz options, choose Options... in the Play menu. The following dialog box appears:



Second Chance Box. If the second chance box has no X in it, it is unchecked and you will have only one chance to answer each question.

If the second chance box has an X in it, it is checked and you will have two chances to answer correctly. On second chance answers, you can only earn half of the points possible on the first chance.

In the Options... dialog box, click the Second chance box to check or uncheck it.

Number of Questions. To set the number of questions in your quiz, click in the number of questions box and enter a number. Atlas Explorer will give you that number of questions and then end the quiz automatically. You can also end the quiz by selecting End Quiz in the Play menu.


Unlimited box. When the Unlimited box has an X in it, it is checked and Atlas Explorer will present quiz questions until you end the quiz. Click the Unlimited box to check or uncheck it.

Click OK when the options are set the way you want them. The options you set become the default options for that session and remain active for every subsequent quiz until you change them again. Then, the new settings become the default settings for the session. However, if you quit from Atlas Explorer, the settings will revert back to Atlas Explorer's standard defaults.

To cancel the new settings, click Cancel.

Starting a quiz

To start a quiz, move to the map on which you want to be quizzed. Let's take a quiz on North America. Move to North America in Explorer mode until its name appears in the title bar. This is the area on which you will be quizzed.




Choose Begin Quiz from the Play menu. The following dialog box appears on your screen:



First, select the category of questions desired. Click Locations to be quizzed on places you should be able to identify in North America, or click General facts to be quizzed on facts such as population and area.

Second, select the geographical level at which you want to be quizzed. Click Country to be quizzed at the country level, or click Cities to be quizzed on cities. (NOTE: This set of options may change or be eliminated, depending on the level at which you chose to start the quiz. If you started the quiz with the state of Minnesota highlighted on the screen and in the title bar, for example, this second set of options would not appear.)

Now, click OK to start the quiz. The first question will appear on the bottom of your screen.



All questions are multiple choice. There are usually four choices shown at the bottom of the screen, just below the question. These choices are always labelled A, B, C, and D.


There are always two alternative methods which you may use to indicate the correct choice.

One method is to use the keyboard. Press the key (A, B, C, or D) which identifies the correct choice.

The other method lets you use the mouse. Click on one of the choices shown at the bottom of the screen.

Some location questions label the choices on the map. A line is shown which connects a country to letter A, B, C, or D. You may make your choice using either of the two methods described above. In addition you may click directly on the country in the map. (If the circle shown at the end of the indicator line is larger than the country, you may click anywhere in the circle.)


You may not answer by clicking on the letter shown at the end of the line.



If you get the answer right, a message that you answered correctly appears on your screen, and Atlas Explorer moves on to the next question.


If your answer is wrong and if the option—second chance—is set, then you will be asked to try again. (See Setting quiz options for details on the options command.)

If you didn't have the option set or you already missed once then the following dialog box appears:



Click OK. Atlas Explorer will move on to the next question.

Many of the location questions ask you to identify a country which is highlighted on the map. Since small countries are difficult to highlight on the continent map, a map which blows up an area of the continent will be displayed in these cases. Some countries are so small that even when they are highlighted on the blow-up they are not easily seen. For this reason, the program also places a blinking starburst on the highlighted area.



After you answer a question in which a small country was highlighted on a blow-up map, the continent map will reappear.

Quiz scoring

When taking a quiz, Atlas Explorer calculates your score according to how quickly you answer the question correctly. The quicker you make the correct choice, the more points you earn. You score is tallied in the upper right hand corner of the screen. If the play options are set to give you a second chance at a question that you miss, the score clock is reset, but you can only earn half the points you could have earned on the first try.

Ending the quiz

A quiz ends either when you have completed a set number of questions (see Setting quiz options) or when you choose End Quiz from the Play menu. The following window appears to show you how you have done:



Your score and rank is displayed, and if your score for this quiz was high enough, it is displayed among the top five scores on record. The score is based only on the quiz that was just completed.


To Return to Explorer mode, click Cancel. To take another quiz, click Play Again.

Retaking the quiz

After taking a quiz, you may want to try it again. Just choose Retake Quiz from the Review menu and Atlas Explorer will run the same questions again. This gives you a chance to review the questions one more time.

Retake options

Atlas Explorer lets you retake all of the quiz questions or just those that you missed the first time you tried the quiz. Just choose Retake Options... from the Review menu and the following dialog box appears:




Click the box for All questions or Missed questions and click OK. Atlas Explorer lets you retake the quiz according to these options. These options stay in effect until you change them again.

End Retake


To end a replay of quiz questions, choose End Retake from the Review menu. Atlas Explorer will return to Explorer mode.

Review List

Before retaking a quiz, you may want to review the questions on your last quiz. Choose Review List from the Review menu and a dialog box appears on your screen:



Click the options you want. You can review all the questions or only those you missed, and you can see them on a screen or print them on a printer. Click OK to get the list.



The format of the questions and answers is as follows. The question is shown first. If it was incorrectly answered, it will be preceded by an asterisk (*). The choices are shown below the question. The correct choice is shown first. The other choices are shown in parentheses. If an incorrect choice was made, it is underlined.

Click on the close box to return to Explorer mode.

NOTE: The Review List and Retake Quiz commands refer only to the most recent quiz. Whenever Begin Quiz is chosen, a new quiz is started, and all previous quiz questions are no longer available under the Review List or Retake Quiz commands. Retake Quiz, and Review List are available only as long as you keep the same map (used during the quiz) on the screen.

Review of results

One of the main features of Atlas Explorer is that it saves the results of your quizzes and enables you to analyze them to see how you are doing in comparison to the rest of your class.

Record Keeping

Record Keeping is a special feature of Atlas Explorer that enables you to:

- · use New Player command
- use Session Analysis command
- · win mastery icons for your performance

The Record Keeping command in the Play menu turns Record Keeping on and off. If it is checked when you pull down a menu, Record Keeping is on, and choosing the command will turn it off. If it is unchecked, Record Keeping is off, and choosing the command will turn Record Keeping on.


If record keeping is off, Atlas Explorer will not save the results of your work.

NOTE: Turning Record Keeping off will minimize the need to swap disks if you have only one disk drive. However, you will not be able to save the results of quizzes. This means that you can't use session analysis to see your improvement or determine the areas where you need more study.

If record keeping is on, Atlas Explorer will save the results of your work on the data disk. To turn record keeping on, simply choose Record Keeping in the Play menu.



Enter your name in the box and click OK. Atlas Explorer will ask you to select a data disk and/or folder.



Click Eject to eject the program disk if you have only one disk drive, and insert a data disk. If you have two disk drives or a hard drive, insert a disk into the open drive. Click Drive to change drives, if necessary.

Double-click a folder name to select it as your data folder. Click OK.

To see if record keeping is on or off, pull down the Play menu. If there is a check mark next to the Record Keeping command, record keeping is on. If not, it is off. Turn it on or off simply by choosing the command.

Mastery Icons

The Mastery icons that appear on the world map in Atlas Explorer monitor your progress in learning the geography of the world. They only work when Record Keeping is on and they maintain a running tally of your ability to identify countries and/or states and provinces on a continent. There is one mastery icon associated with each continent, and each time you correctly identify a country not previously identified by you, your total percentage of correctly identified countries will increase, and you will eventually earn the next icon. Correct answers are only counted toward mastery icons, however, when Record Keeping is on, so you must be sure to turn it on if your session is going to count.

Each icon represents a different level of mastery, as follows:

Name		Icon	Correctly identify
Explorer	, ,	Compass	All countries
Jet Setter		Jet	75%
Traveler		Suitcase	50%
Tourist		Camera	25%
Provincial		Shoe	Less than 25%

Play until you're an Explorer on all continents!

New Player

The New Player... command in the Play menu is active only when record keeping is on. It enables a new player to enter his name and the date so that his scores will be saved under his name rather than under the previous player's name. When you choose New Player..., the following dialog box appears:




Just enter your name and click OK. If you mistype your name you may edit it. If you change your mind and decide you didn't want a new player then click cancel. The previous player's name will continue to be used.

Session Analysis

Atlas Explorer's Session Analysis enables you to analyze the results of any quiz session saved on the data disk. It identifies the subject matter of the quiz, provides a summary of performance, and a list of incorrect questions. This will help you focus your studies.

To begin session analysis, choose Session Analysis from the Review menu. The following dialog box appears:



In the Student's Name box, select a name by clicking it. You may need to scroll to find the desired name if there is data for many students on the disk. Each time you select a different student's name, the list in the session

box changes to show the list of sessions saved for that student.

After first selecting the name you may then select the date and quiz number you want to analyze in the Session box. If the desired quiz session does not appear, scroll through the dialog box until you find it. If the correct session still does not appear, record keeping was probably off at the time the quiz was taken.

When both a name and quiz session are selected, click OK.

Here, you can see all the session information. The error box at the bottom of the window lists the mistakes made. You can use this as a review guide.

In this window, you have three options. To print the session analysis card, click print. If your printer is ready, Atlas Explorer will print out the information in this window.

To choose a different session for review, click Change Session. The name and session dialog boxes appear, and you can make a new selection.

To Return to the last map you worked on in Explorer mode, click Cancel.
